A brief history of our long association


Q: Just how long have C, P, & R been a part of what would come to be UMW? A: Between 1911, when our ancestral college, the State Normal and Industrial School for Women (a college for teachers), and 1979, when the official department of Classics, Philosophy, and Religion Department (CPRD) was formed, these three programs underwent many changes and developments. Classics-at least, Latin-was part of the curriculum from the start. Philosophy was not added as a course of study until 1937, when it first bloomed within the Psychology and Education Department. Religion was not added till many years later, 1965, with the arrival of the noted historian of Christianity, Elizabeth Clark. Dr. Clark chaired Religion until the formal creation of CPRD in 1979 of which she served as inaugural chair till 1982 before departing for Duke. She was succeeded by Janet Wishner (PHIL), Bob Boughner (CLAS), and Jim Goehring (RELG), culminating in our beloved Craig Vasey (PHIL), who remained in the role longer than any before-from 1999 until 2019. A huge thank you to Professor Vasey for serving us so well for so many years and a huge welcome to Professor Romero as our new chair!
