Some of our readers might have heard of the university's restructuring process. While students might not notice any difference, our faculty was watching carefully the reassignment of departments to Schools, all of which then make up a college. The new organizational structure offers chances for new cooperation between departments. Our department will be in a School of the Humanities (this title might change) together with English, Classics, Philosophy, Religion, Art History, Anthropology as well as the Department of Digital Studies. I can imagine several research projects and new classes springing from this new organizational unit.

The reorganization also made the different programs and departments think about what their essence is. I think our name change over a decade ago expresses this nicely: Instead of being a department of foreign (=other) languages, we stress the fact that the Modern Languages we teach are native languages to millions of people, even to most of our faculty. And the Literatures highlight that we teach more than just languages and that almost all our faculty do research on literary works. Therefore, I am confident that we will find connections to our colleagues in the English-speaking literatures, to the linguists, the art historians, and Philosophy.

GUEST SPEAKER: ROBERTO ZURBANO



On Tuesday October 24th, 2023

Roberto Zurbano Torres, internationally recognized Afro Cuban writer, cultural critic, and activist against racism in Cuba, visited several classes to speak on the translation of his controversial NYT article, "For Blacks in Cuba, the Revolution Hasn't Begun" and on a film screening of a documentary on his life entitled "Zurbano y su conciencia racial" (2022). Dr. Marisa Martinez Mira and Dr. Ana Chichester provided simultaneous translation. Mr. Zurbano gave a public lecture on RACE AND RACISM: THE BLACK EXPERIENCE IN CUBA. Introduced by

Dr. Marcelo Fajardo-Cárdenas, English interpretation was provided by Dr. Patricia Orozco Watrel and Dr. Gonzalo Campos Dintrans. In addition to MDLL, Mr. Zurbano's visit was sponsored by several departments across campus, including Classics, Philosophy and Religion, Bachelor of Liberal Studies, English and Linguistics, History and American Studies, and the Khatib Program for Religion and Dialogue. Elizabeth Baylor Neatrour '54 and Mary Ellen Stephenson Memorial Scholarship in French

Total average award budget \$4,500* Rising juniors or seniors with a declared major in French. Students may also use this scholarship for study abroad in countries where French is the predominant language. Interested students should seek advice from their major advisor and the Center for International Education to select an appropriate program of study.

Grace Cutler Hamilton Scholarship for French Study

Total average award budget \$2,400* This scholarship supports semester or year-long international study in France. The scholarship is open to French majors or to any student who is interested in furthering their facility in French and experiencing French culture. Special consideration is given to students with demonstrated financial need. Students should seek advice from their major advisor and the Center for International Education to select an appropriate program of study.

Kathy Liggett Leis '69 Scholarship for French Study

Total average award budget \$2,000* This scholarship supports semester or year-long international study in France. The scholarship is open to French majors or to any student who is interested in furthering their facility in French and experiencing French culture. Special consideration is given to students with demonstrated financial need. Students should seek advice from their major advisor and the Center for International Education to select an appropriate program of study.

Fita Rivas Scholarship in Spanish

Total average award budget \$1,600* Rising juniors or seniors with a declared major in Spanish and who are planning to continue their studies in graduate school. Applicants should complete the Future Graduate School section of the application.

Steve Rabson Scholarship in Japanese

Two awards of \$750 each. The scholarships are awarded to two UMW students continuing their studies of Japanese language beyond the Beginning level.
